Natural stone products for use in the home - a buyers guide.

This is a guide on how to select both the material and the professionals for your natural stone project.

The use of stone such as marble, limestone, sandstone, slate and granite has gained in popularity for use in domestic applications. It has become the first choice for the interior designer and consumer when there is a desire to use natural as opposed to manufactured material and its use is regularly featured in the most popular and influential interior design magazines.

To meet the growing demand the number of shops and DIY warehouse outlets selling tiles, slabs or kitchen worktops, has also increased with highly competitive prices offered in comparison to ceramic and porcelain products.

Indigenous UK stones are identified by traditional name, quarry location and often have proven historical usage. A significant quantity of stone tiles, slabs and worktops used for residential works are however imported from all over the world. These are often given commercial names with no information about origin, characteristics or expected performance.





Buyers of stone for domestic applications should therefore ensure that they establish the necessary information from the seller in relation to the proposed use and suitability.

The following checklist is presented to assist in this process.

Petrological description

Establish the traditional name, quarry location and country of origin.

Technical characteristics

Check that packaging has a **CE** mark and refers to a product standard (e.g. BS EN 12058 floors and stairs, BS EN 1341 external paving, BS EN 120578 modular tiles). These set out dimensional requirements, visual appearance and technical requirements (e.g. frost resistance).

Slip resistance

For flooring and paving, check how the stone performs in wet conditions. Particular attention should be made to ensure that the values presented relate to the surface finish under consideration.

Treatment & cleaning

Check with the seller whether the stone should be sealed for your proposed application and if so the type of recommended product. The appropriate cleaning methods and products should also be established.

Finally, if you are paying to have the stone laid ensure that the installer is experienced in the installation of stone. Choosing the right stone and following good practice for installation should provide a floor that will perform for at least 20 years.

Code of Practice for the Design and Installation of Kitchen Worktops

This Code gives recommendations for the design, manufacturer and installation of natural stone for use as kitchen worktops and other similar surfaces and has been described as the essential document for anyone wishing to use natural stone in this area.

Code of Practice for the Design and Installation of Internal Flooring

Based on the relevant parts of a number of British Standards relating to the design and installation of natural stone floors, this Code also incorporates the requirements of the latest European Standards and current good practice.

It sets out the principal factors involved when deciding to use natural stone as flooring and considers stone selection, design, laying, protection and maintenance, to assist in avoiding or disappointment with aesthetic results. This code will prove invaluable if you are intending to use natural stone in any type of flooring situation.

The Code is £50.00 (£30.00 for Stone Federation members) including postage and packing (postage charge for overseas).

Guide to Best Practice on the cleaning of internal and external masonry surfaces (including stone, brick, terracotta, concrete and faïence).

The Guide covers all aspects of cleaning external and internal masonry surfaces, including stone, brick, terracotta, concrete and faïence, and is available to clients, architects, specifiers and Stone Federation members only.
